## The First Communion on the Moon!



"The day is Yours, and Yours also the night, for You established the sun and the moon." Psalm 74:16

This year we celebrated the 50th Anniversary of men landing on the moon, on July 20, 1969. Something else very interesting and historic that you may not be aware of also happened on that date—the first Christian service of Holy Communion on the moon!

After the Apollo 11 Eagle lunar module landed on the moon, astronauts Neil Armstrong and Buzz Aldrin were ordered to wait, for a planned rest period and various system checks, before they could literally take the next "big step" in their mission—onto the lunar surface. Aldrin spent this time inside the cramped lunar module doing something he had carefully planned and prepared for that moment: giving thanks to God by partaking of the Sacrament of Holy Communion.

Though the rite itself was simple it was not spontaneous, since it took a great deal of advance preparation to have the necessary elements for Communion aboard the lunar module with the astronauts. A devout Christian, Aldrin was an elder at Webster Presbyterian Church in Houston. Before he headed into space he got special permission from NASA to take consecrated bread and wine from his church along with him and give himself Communion—on the moon!

Many previous astronauts had already prayed in space, including a reading from the creation story in Genesis 1:1-9 by the three Apollo 8 astronauts while orbiting the moon

the previous Christmas Eve, on December 24, 1968. But, Aldrin was about to go one step further—literally and figuratively. Part of his mission was not only to land on the moon, as pilot of the lunar module, but also to be only the second human ever to walk on it. To prepare himself, he took Communion while waiting inside the Eagle lunar module on the moon's Sea of Tranquility.





The mood in the module was sober. Both Armstrong and Aldrin knew how important their mission was. "I was certainly aware that this was a culmination of the work of 300,000 or 400,000 people over a decade, and that the nation's hopes and outward appearance largely rested on how the results came out." Armstrong recalled.

As the men prepared for the next phase of their mission, Aldrin got on the comm system and spoke to the ground crew back on Earth. "I would like to request a few moments of silence," he said. "I would like to invite each person listening in, wherever and whomever he may be, to contemplate for a moment the events of the past few hours and to give thanks in his own individual way."

Then he reached into the small bag each astronaut was allotted for personal belongings, and took out the bread and wine he had transported into space—which was also the first food or drink of any type ever consumed on the moon. "I poured the wine into the chalice our church had given me. In the one-sixth gravity of the moon the wine curled slowly and gracefully up the side of the cup," he later wrote. Armstrong looked on quietly but did not participate.

Before partaking of the bread and wine, Aldrin read an appropriate selection of Scripture that he had handwritten on a card and also brought with him from earth, John 15:5, from Jesus' words at the Last Supper: "And Jesus said, "I am the Vine, you are the branches. Whoever remains in Me, and I in him, will bear much fruit; for you can do nothing without Me."

Aldrin wanted the service broadcast to the entire world. However, atheist activist Madalyn Murray O'Hair had sued NASA the previous year, after the broadcast of Apollo 8 astronauts reading from Genesis. Though the case was dismissed, it made an impression on NASA officials, who worried that broadcasting an overtly religious act such as the Christian Sacrament of Holy Communion would entangle the agency in more lawsuits.

When Aldrin told the flight crew operations manager about his plan to broadcast a Communion service from the moon, the manager told him to go ahead and have Communion, but "keep your comments more general." So, Aldrin kept the ceremony low-key.

It was not done in secret, however, but was widely reported at the time that Aldrin had brought along Communion bread and wine aboard the spacecraft, and partook of Holy Communion before being the second human after Armstrong to step onto the surface of the moon.

However, this interesting fact of historywas overshadowed by the landing itself, and Armstrong's famous declaration upon setting foot on the moon: "That's one small step for man, one giant leap for mankind."

Though he was the first, Aldrin hasn't been the only United States astronaut to

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
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receive Holy Communion in outer space. In 1994, three Roman Catholic astronauts received the Sacrament while orbiting the earth in Space Shuttle Endeavor.

The first Holy Communion in outer space was only experienced by one man and witnessed by another, but although it was largely unknown at the time it hasn't been forgotten. "Lunar Communion Sunday" is still celebrated annually at Webster Presbyterian Church in Houston to commemorate this event, and Aldrin—who is still living at 89 years old—has often written and spoken about this unique experience. As he said in his 2010 memoir: "I could think of no better way to acknowledge the Apollo 11 experience than by giving thanks to God."

At the end of their mission, Aldrin broadcast to earth another very appropriate selection of Scripture, Psalm 8:3-4: "When I consider Thy heavens, the works of Thy fingers, the moon and the stars, which Thou hast ordained, what is man that you are mindful of him, and the son of man that Thou visitest him?"
