Pacific Lutheran College. In an article in *Bible Review*, Borg wrote: "To put it boldly, I am one of those Christians who does not believe in the virgin birth, nor in the star of Bethlehem, nor in the journey of the wisemen, nor in the shepherds coming to the manger, as facts of history."

 John Shelby Spong is the retired Episcopal bishop of Newark, New Jersey. In his book, Born of a Woman: A Bishop Rethinks the Birth of Jesus, Spong concludes that Mary probably became pregnant when she was raped by a Roman soldier. Mary then fabricated the story of the angel's visit and the miraculous conception of Jesus as a way of explaining her pregnancy.

St. Paul himself passes judgment on so-called "scholars" such as Borg and Spong, who reject the teachings of the Bible: "They do not know what they are talking about or what they so confidently affirm" (1 Timothy 1:7).

The truth is, all the details of Christ's birth as reported in the first two chapters of Matthew and Luke fit perfectly with both the Old Testament prophecies of

the Messiah's coming, and what we know about the historical situation at that time. All the objections of so-called "scholars" are entirely bogus.

For example, liberal "scholars" claim that the Hebrew word almah in Isaiah 7:14 does not mean "virgin" but simply "a young woman of marriageable age," supposedly with no indication one way or the other as to her virginity. (Unfortunately, the translation "young woman" has worked its way into several Bible versions, including the Revised Standard Version and New Revised Standard Version.)

The contention that "a young woman of marriageable age" does not indicate physical virginity ignores that the punishment for adultery in Old Testament times was being stoned to death (Deuteronomy 22:20-21). In that culture, "a young woman of marriageable age" was a virgin—or else she was dead!

Besides Isaiah 7:14, almah is found six other times in the Hebrew Old Testament

"Therefore the Lord Himself will give you a sign: Behold, the Virgin shall conceive and bear a Son, and shall call His name Immanuel." (Isaiah 7:14)

Jay Leno, former host of "The Tonight Show," joked that atheists are planning their own re-make of the classic Christmas movie "Miracle on 34th Street." He said the atheists' version would be called "Coincidence on 34th Street."

But, these days, it seems it doesn't take an atheist to deny the miracles of the first Christmas:

• The late Marcus J. Borg was a professor of theology at Oregon State University. His roots were Lutheran (but a different church body than The Lutheran Church–Missouri Synod), several of his books were published by Fortress Press, a publishing house of the Evangelical Lutheran Church in America, and he served as a visiting professor at the ELCA's



Church in America, and he served as a visiting Annunciation of the Angel Gabriel to the Virgin Mary professor at the ELCA's as recorded in Luke 1:26-38 in this 1501 woodcut.

(Genesis 24:43; Exodus 2:8; Psalm 68:25; Proverbs 30:19; Song of Songs 1:3, 6:8). None of these occurrences in any way indicates a young woman who is not a virgin, and the fact of physical virginity is obvious in the first two instances.

Also, in two places, one of them being Isaiah 7:14, the Greek version of the Old Testament, the Septuagint, translated almahwith parthenos, the Greek word for a virgin in the technical sense. (The famous Parthenon in Athens was named after Athena, a virgin false goddess in Greek mythology.) So, it seems the Septuagint translators understood almah to mean a physical virgin. And in Ugaritic the more common Semitic word for virgin, bethuwlah, is used in poetic parallelism with almah. In short, the linguistic evidence is conclusive that the Hebrew words for "virgin" and "a young woman of marriageable age" are synonyms. both indicating physical virginity.

The ultimate objective of this campaign to replace "virgin" in Isaiah 7:14 with "young woman" is to deny the validity of the New Testament's application of this verse to the conception and birth of Jesus (Matthew 1:22-23). Liberal "scholars" claim that Isaiah 7:10ff was not originally intended to be a prophecy about Jesus' conception and birth, but that it originally referred only to some unknown child, born immediately after the prophecy was given.

The original context of Isaiah 7:10-14 was a confrontation between the great prophet Isaiah and King Ahaz, the most wicked of the Old Testament kings, who reigned from 735 B.C. to 715 B.C. (For an account of Ahaz's reign, see 2 Kings 16 and 2 Chronicles 28.) Foreign armies were threatening Judah, and Isaiah brings Ahaz the good news that Judah will not be conquered. The Lord bids Ahaz to seek a sign confirming this promise.

Because unbelieving Ahaz, who worshipped other gods, refuses to seek a sign from the Lord, Isaiah announces that God Himself will give an amazing sign: The coming Messiah will be born of a Virgin! "Is it not enough to try the patience of men? Will you try the patience of my God also? Therefore the Lord Himself will give you a sign: Behold, the Virgin shall conceive and bear a Son, and shall call His name Immanuel" (Isaiah 7:13-14).

This was a devastating humiliation from the Lord for Ahaz and his descendants. For, the great glory of the Hebrew kings was that the ultimate King of Kings would come from their line. Now, however, the Lord announces through Isaiah that though the Messiah will indeed still be born of the house of David, because of the wickedness and unfaithfulness of Ahaz and the other Hebrew kings, He would be of *female* lineage only—miraculously born of a Virgin!

Just as Isaiah 7:14 indicates the deity of the coming Messiah with the title "Immanuel," which is Hebrew for "God with Us," Isaiah 7:15 indicates His humanity: "He will eat curds and honey before He knows enough to reject the wrong and choose the right."

Like today's mushy baby foods, "curds and honey" was the classic first solid food given to infants in ancient times. Isaiah predicts that, because He will be "Immanuel," both God and man, the Messiah will eat typicial human baby foods as an infant and toddler, before reaching the age for discerning right and wrong. Although miraculously conceived and born of a Virgin, He will neverthless grow and develop in a normal human manner (Luke 2:52), and experience normal human sensations, such as hunger (Matthew 4:2).

Because this prophecy of Isaiah was given over six centuries before the birth of Christ, some contend it cannot apply to Him, because Isaiah 7:16ff supposedly ties the birth of Immanuel to the period immediately following the prophecy: "But before the Boy knows enough to reject the wrong and choose the right . . . The LORD will bring on you and on your people . . . the king of Assyria."

This prophecy was indeed fulfilled when Assyria conquered Judah within decades after this fate was foretold. However, Isaiah does *not* say the Messiah's birth will take place *immediately* after these events, but simply pronounces, as an additional judgement upon Ahaz, that *sometime* before the Messiah comes Judah will be conquered and the house of Ahaz overthrown—exactly what happened.

Of course, the definitive interpretation of Isaiah 7:14 is found in the New Testament, where the Holy Spirit Himself interprets the meaning of this prophecy: "An angel of the Lord appeared to him in a dream and said, 'Joseph son of David, do not be afraid to take Mary home as your wife. because what is conceived in her is from the Holy Spirit. She will give birth to a Son, and you are to give Him the name Jesus, because He will save His people from their sins.' All this took place to fulfill what the Lord had said through the prophet: 'The Virgin will be with child and will give birth to a Son, and they will call Him Immanuel'—which means. 'God with us'" (Matthew 1:20-23).

Chinese Lutheran Service Book Dedicated

"This hymnal is vital to the life of our church," said Rev. Andrew Miao, President of the China Evangelical Lutheran Church (CELC) during the recent dedication ceremony at the CELC headquarters in Chiayi, Taiwan of the new *Chinese Lutheran Service Book* (CLSB).

This new Chinese hymnal is written in Mandarin and contains the setting of Divine Service I from *Lutheran Service Book* (LSB), Matins, Vespers, Luther's Small Catechism, selected psalms, prayers, services for Holy Baptism and Confirmation, as well as hymns.

The CELC was assisted in this project by LCMS Deaconess Sandra Rhein, who serves as a hymnal translation consultant for the LCMS Office of International Mission, and LCMS missionary Rev. Michael Paul, who served as primary translator and editor. This

follows successful completion of a Swahili Lutheran hymnal for the Evangelical Lutheran Church in Kenya in 2012. The entire LSB has also been translated into French, for use in Canada, France, and the many French-speaking nations in Africa.



The latest translation of *Lutheran Service Book* is in Mandarin, joining translations in Swahili and French.

Rhein explained the difficulty of hymnal translation. Wooden translations and simple musical notations do not make a usable hymnal. Instead, the words need to be translated with the poetry of the hymn and the meter of the

music in mind. In addition to all that, Paul added that a prime concern is that, "The theology has to be correct."

Developing a hymnal in a foreign language involves far more than just translating words. Even musical notation differs between cultures. So, Rhein consulted with the manufacturer of the leading musical notation software to make the appropriate adjustments. After helping with this project, they decided this is something they want to market for others who may also be creating Mandarin hymnals—so this Lutheran project will impact other Christians too.

"The Lutheran church does not survive well if we do not teach our hymns to our children," said LCMS President Matthew Harrison at the dedication ceremony. Miao is overjoyed to see the new hymnal for his church body. Reflecting the unity of these partner church bodies, even in the midst of different languages, everyone sang "O Morning Star, How Fair and Bright" (CLSB 203, LSB 395) in English and Chinese simultaneously.
