Greetings in Christ,

Just a month ago none of us could have ever dreamed the situation in which we and our nation, indeed the whole world, now find ourselves. Tumultuous events have swept over us like a flood and suddenly everything has changed.

That's the same scenario behind the story of Jesus calming a violent storm on the Sea of Galilee (Matthew 14:22-36). The Sea of Galilee is normally a peaceful, placid lake. But, occasionally extremely violent storms erupt, suddenly and without warning.

Modern meteorologists explain it's because the Sea of Galilee itself is below sea level but is surrounded by very high, steep hills. This causes abrupt shifts in temperature which produce a whirlwind effect and sudden, unusually violent storms.

That's often how it happens in our lives. We're sailing smoothly along on the calm sea of life, and suddenly, out of nowhere, there comes into our life a terrible storm: Injury, sickness, death; financial problems, trouble with work or business, job loss; struggles within our marriage or family; accidents, injuries, natural disasters. Of course the mighty storm at present that has unexpectedly struck us all is this terrible, miserable virus outbreak. Some years ago when a severe storm battered the coast of Bangladesh, the Associated Press quoted one man whose hut was flattened: "It's God's punishment, but for what?" That often is our natural first reaction to trouble and suffering in our lives, to assume that God is punishing us.

The bad news is we do indeed deserve punishment from God because of our sin, as we say in our Liturgy: "I confess unto you all my sins and iniquities with which I have ever offended You and justly deserved Your temporal and eternal punishment." But, the Good News is your sins are all forgiven for the sake of Jesus Christ, as the Liturgy continues: "But I am heartily sorry for them and sincerely repent of them, and I pray You of your boundless mercy and for the sake of the holy, innocent, bitter sufferings and death of Your beloved Son, Jesus Christ, to be gracious and merciful to me, a poor sinful being." Good News is, God's Son, Jesus Christ, took your sins upon Himself and suffered all the punishment for you, in your place.

That is why Paul can say in Romans 8:31, *"If God is for us, who can be against us?"* God is not punishing you, God is not against you; He forgives you, He loves you; He is *for* you, He is on your side, because Jesus Christ cancelled out all your sins and earned you God's favor.

While it is true that sin is ultimately the root cause of all natural disasters and calamities, because sin spoiled the perfection of creation, it is *not* true that God sends disasters and calamities upon Christians as a punishment for sin.

For those who trust in Jesus Christ, trouble and suffering in your life such as the current pestilence, even death itself if that should befall you or a loved one, is *not ever* a punishment from God, but actually God somehow working all things

together for your good. As Paul says in Romans 8:28-39: "And we know that God works all things together for the good of those who love Him. . . Who shall separate us from the love of Christ? Shall trouble or hardship or persecution or famine or nakedness or danger or sword?...No, in all these things we are more than conquerors through Him who loved us. For I am convinced that neither death nor life, neither angels nor demons, neither the present nor the future, nor any powers, neither height nor depth, nor anything else in all creation, will be able to separate us from the love of God that is in Christ Jesus our Lord." God is not angry with you; He is on your side, and somehow working all things together for your good.

So, why is there suffering in our world? Because of the Fall into sin, our world is not what it should be, not at all what God intended it to be. Sin spoiled the perfection of God's creation, and the sufferings we face in this world are the residual effect, the lingering result, of the Fall into sin.

As long as we are in this world we still endure the sufferings brought on by the imperfection of our fallen world: sickness, accidents, disasters, violence, crime, discord, strife, all culminating in physical death. Just as it is now normal for our imperfect bodies to sometimes

However, while it is true that sin is ultimately the root cause of all natural disasters and calamities, because sin spoiled the perfection of creation, it is not true that God sends disasters and calamities upon Christians as a punishment for sin. Bad things which happen to Christians here on earth are *never* a punishment from God. Psalm 103:10 puts it plainly: "He does not punish us as our sins deserve, or repay us according to our iniquities." That's because Jesus Christ already paid the punishment your sins deserve, as Isaiah 53:6 proclaims: "The Lord has laid on Him the iniquity of us all."

God is not angry at our world! God is not angry with you! God forgives the sins of the whole world for Jesus' sake. As Paul writes in 2 Corinthians 5:19: *"God was in Christ reconciling the world unto Himself, not counting men's sins against them."* You can be certain that your sufferings are *never* targeted punishments from God for particular sins. Rather, your sufferings are the *general* result of the sorry state of our fallen world.

Faith in Christ means the end of eternal suffering, but not necessarily the end of earthly suffering. Revelation 21:4 says that in heaven, *"there will be no more death or mourning or crying or pain, for the old order of things has passed away."* But, until then, on the way to eternal life we may still pass through much suffering in this life, as Paul says in Acts 14:22, *"We must through much tribulation enter into the kingdom of God."* 

Psalm 18:6 declares, "In my distress I called to the Lord; I cried to my God for help. In His temple He heard my voice and listened to my cry for help." In all times of trouble such as we are now enduring, turn to the Lord for help and comfort, in prayer, in His Word and Sacraments, and in worship. As Psalm 46 says, "God is our refuge and strength, an ever-present help in trouble. Therefore we will not fear, though the earth give way and the mountains fall into the heart of the sea, though its waters roar and foam . . . . The Lord Almighty is with us."

Because many are unable to attend worship during this time, we are broadcasting our worship services at Trinity, live on the church's Facebook page (www.facebook.com/ trinitylutheranblock) at 10:00am Sundays. Our thanks to Stacy Elkinton, Michelle Haley, Kevin Prothe, and others who are making these livestream broadcasts possible.

Lord willing, we hope to resume regular services on May 3, or sooner if the authorities allow. Interestingly, if the Facebook viewer statistics are accurate, we're getting about our regular "attendance" via livestream.

We are now including the full liturgy and hymns in the bulletin so that those worshipping at home can follow along without the need for a hymnal. The current service bulletin is online at www.trinitylcms.org/bulletin. Also the printed text of the sermon is available in advance at www.trinitylcms.org/ sermons. For your convenience, in preparation for the service you may wish to print out the bulletin and/or text of the message.

In addition to the livestream, the day after each service another video of the entire service, and printed text and audio of the sermon only, are posted on our church's website at www.trinitylcms.org/sermons. Our thanks to Greg Windler for use of his video camera to make these videos.

Another wonderful resource for home worship is videos of Missouri Synod services from "Worship Anew" at www.worshipanew.org. These broadcasts are led by Missouri Synod pastors and feature familiar hymns and liturgy.

Similar to "Worship Anew" is the program "Main Street Living" at www.mainstreetliving.com, featuring services led by Missouri Synod pastors from South Dakota, Minnesota, Nebraska, and Iowa.



### Next Communion Scheduled for May 3

The elders and pastor discussed many options and ideas for how to hold Holy Communion during this time, but determined it was logistically problematic to maintain the recommended "social distancing."

Therefore, the next scheduled Holy Communion at Trinity is Sunday, May 3, though that could be cancelled if the "stay home" and "social distancing" orders are still in place at that time. Anyone desiring Holy Communion before then is encouraged to request private Communion from the pastor, who will be happy to arrange that with you.



Due to the requirement at this time to "stay home" and practice "social distancing," all events, meetings, and activities at Trinity, other than livestream broadcasts of our services, have been suspended until further notice. This includes Sunday School, Adult Bible Class, nursing home services, choir, coffee hour after services, and our Worship for Shut-Ins previously planned for April.

Look for announcements for their resumption when the authorities lift the "stay home" order and prohibition on "public gatherings" of more than ten persons.



### Pastoral Care During Quarantine

During this time Pastor Vogts is generally not making visits, so as not to inadvertently carry the virus to anyone. However, *please* notify him if you or a loved one should become ill or hospitalized. Especially in serious cases, he can get special permission as a pastor to visit parishioners and provide spiritual care in a medical facility, while wearing protective gear.
