A decade ago our family was blessed to vacation during late November at Disney World, in conjunction with the annual LCMS Fall Leadership Conference, because at the time I was vice-chair of the Synod's Board for Communication Services.

The highlight of our Disney experience was the amazing Christmas lighting display at their studios. The "city street" backlot was decked with *millions* of lights, flashing in sync with Christmas carols. With the help of Disney special effects magic it even "snowed" on cue—in Florida!

It was the most beautiful display I've ever seen, but there was something important missing: Almost no references to the event that started it all some 2,000 years ago, the birth of Christ.

It's easy for us also to get so wrapped up in the *doing* of Christmas that we forget the *meaning* of Christmas. We've got the glitz, but no God; the lights, but no Lord; the celebration, but no Christ. Jesus Himself expresses the true significance of His birth into our world this way: *"For God so loved the world that He gave his only-begotten Son, that whoever believes in Him shall not perish but have eternal life. For God did not send His Son into the world to condemn the world, but to save the world through Him. Whoever believes in Him is not condemned."*(John 3:16-18)

He is the very Son of God, come down to earth and made man. By His life, death and resurrection from the dead, He made up for your sin and reconciled you to God, so that your sins are not counted against you. As the Apostle Paul says: *"For in Christ all the fullness of the Deity lives in bodily form.* ... For God was pleased to have all his *fullness dwell in Him, and through Him to reconcile to Himself all things ... by making peace through His blood, shed on the cross."*(Colossians 1:19-20, 2:9)

That's what it's really all about: the lights, the trees, the decorations, the gifts, the Christmas carols and nativity scenes. We are celebrating the Good News: You are at peace with God, on account of His Son, born into our world as the Babe of Bethlehem.

I wish you and your loved ones a blessed and happy Christmas, as you celebrate your Savior's birth!

After everything we've gone through this year, as the popular song says, *"We need a little Christmas, right this very minute...we need a little Christmas now!"* In that spirit, the Sunday School decided to proceed with their usual Children's Christmas Program at 7:00pm on Christmas Eve, Thursday, December 24. This is a beloved old German tradition, and has no doubt been the unbroken custom observed at Trinity every Christmas Eve for over 150 years.

However, to allow for greater social distancing this year, an additional Christmas Eve Candlelight Service will be held on December 24, at 5:00pm. This extra service will not include the Children's Program, which will only be at the 7:00pm service.

The 5:00pm service will instead follow an old *English* tradition for Christmas Eve, "A Festival of Readings and Carols," featuring favorite carols interspersed with Scripture readings. Pastor Vogts will open the 5:00pm service with the solo "O Holy Night."

Both the 5:00pm and 7:00pm services will include "Silent Night" sung by candlelight. However, there will not be a sermon at the 7:00pm service. Pastor Vogts' message for the 5:00pm service will be "The Two Sides of Christmas" based on Luke 2:15-20.

The purpose of having two Christmas Eve services this year is to reduce attendance at both to allow for some measure of social distancing. To help balance attendance between the two services, if you do not have children or grandchildren in the Children's Program this year, please consider attending the 5:00pm service instead.

Both of these Christmas Eve services will also be livestreamed on our congregation's Facebook page. And the basement will be available with a video feed for overflow, especially for the 7:00pm Children's Program, which normally has our largest attendance of the year.

Despite the difficult circumstances this year, whether online or in person, join in celebrating the real reason for the season!



Our Christmas Day service on Friday, December 25 at 10:00am is a great option for celebrating Christmas with generous social distancing, since typically there are only a few dozen in attendance.

The special order of service will feature readings and carols focusing on the different characters in the Christmas story—Mary, Joseph, Angels, Shepherds, Wise Men—as the candles are gradually lit on the Advent wreath. Pastor Vogts' message for Christmas Day will be "The Living Nativity" based on Luke 2:1-20.

If you cannot attend in person this service will also be livestreamed on our congregation's Facebook page.


