"Jesus Christ is the same yesterday, today, and forever." (Hebrews 13:8)

Among the several funerals at Trinity last month was that of Berniece Wallace. who passed away a few weeks following her 100th birthday. Although she was a lifelong, faithful member of The Lutheran Church—Missouri Synod, you may not be familiar with her name and likely never met her.

That's because she only recently moved to this area to be near her family. and due to COVID concerns at the time of her move worshipped weekly at Trinity either online or in a vehicle. She moved here from a suburb of Chicago, where she still lived in the same house that she and her twin sister were born in on the kitchen table in 1921!

I told her daughter and son-in-law. Debra and Dennis Karina, that Berniece probably had more than a dozen Missouri Synod pastors during her long lifetime, and I was simply privileged to be the one completing the cycle. Another brother LCMS pastor had baptized her and her twin sister as babies over 100 years ago at their church in Chicago, where their father was organist; perhaps another pastor had taught and confirmed her: many others had administered Holy Communion to her countless times over the years and led her in worship as a faithful church member for over a century something like 6,000 services she had attended!

And then it fell to me to stand at her grave at the end of this long line of previous pastors, and give Christian burial to the earthly remains of her body, upon which the first Missouri Synod pastor in

an unbroken chain had poured the waters of Holy Baptism over a century ago.

Her congregation in Chicago was traditional in worship and she said when she moved here one of her friends from there told her she would never find a church with services like those to which she was accustomed. She was a sprightly character and said to me, "I told her there's a Missouri Synod church right by my daughter's house that has services exactly the same!"

Most mainline Protestant bodies are quite new. recently formed by mergers-and declining fast. The Presbyterian Church in the U.S.A. was formed in 1983 with over 3 million members but has fallen to barely a million. When the Evangelical Lutheran Church in America was formed in 1988, at 5.2 million members they were twice the size of the LCMS. But. in the years since they have lost over a third of their members and now have just 3.3 million. The United Methodist Church was formed in 1968 and is now in the midst of a bitter split.

As Lutherans, we obviously have had doctrinal disagreements with the Roman Catholic Church for over 500 vears. But, its members too will tell you that it is not at all the same church in which they grew up.

In contrast, The Lutheran Church— Missouri Synod was founded in 1847 and we will celebrate its 175th anniversary next year, making it just about the oldest continuously existing church body in the United States, and one of the oldest in the world. That's why Berniece could be baptized in a Missouri Synod church in Chicago in 1921, and buried a century later from a Missouri Synod church in Kansas that is, as she said, "exactly the same." But, most importantly, it is not merely the outward structure or the name "Missouri Synod" that has remained the same, but the doctrine.

Jesus said, "If you continue in My Word, you are truly My disciples; and you will know the truth, and the truth will make you free" (John 8:31-32). Another version translates, "If you hold to My teaching, you are really My disciples." But, the opposite is also true: If we do not continue in His Word and hold to His teaching, we are in danger of falling away from Him and ceasing to be His disciples.

Sadly, that's what's happening in many church bodies and congregations that once were solid. Especially on a range of moral and cultural issues, they have not continued in but abandoned Christ's Word and His teachings. I encountered a most blatant example of this while listening online recently to a service of Choral Evensong from the Church of England broadcast by the BBC. Their music is fantastic and their services nearly identical to ours, because much of our familiar liturgy is based on their 1662 Book of Common Prayer.

However, this particular service had a reading that included 1 Corinthians 6:9, which gives a list warning against sinful acts that are inappropriate for Christians: "Neither the sexually immoral, nor idolaters, nor adulterers, nor male prostitutes, nor homosexual offenders, nor thieves, nor the greedy, nor drunkards, nor slanderers, nor swindlers will inherit the kingdom of God." I had to replay the reading of this text to see if I heard it correctly, because they went straight from adultery to thievery, and simply skipped over the words "nor male prostitutes, nor homosexual offenders." Presumably, because it is no longer "politically correct" to criticize certain sins they just cut that out from the Bible reading! So, they are quite literally no longer continuing in God's Word nor holding to the Bible's teachings.

In contrast, we rejoice that The Lutheran Church—Missouri Synod still has exactly the same doctrine upon which it was founded nearly 175 years ago. Because, that doctrine is based on the Word of God, "who cannot lie" (Titus 1:2), and "who does not change like shifting shadows" (James 1:17). As St. Paul says in 2 Thessalonians 2:15: "So then, brothers, stand firm and hold to the teachings we passed on to you."

That does *not* mean, however, that we as individuals nor our congregation have an unwavering loyalty to The Lutheran Church—Missouri Synod! That is precisely the mistake being made by many church members. They are clinging to their church body or congregation as an institution, perhaps remembering nostalgically what it once was, even though it has now wandered from the teachings of the Bible.

But, if the LCMS should ever for sake God's Word, then we must for sake the LCMS! The recently updated Constitution and Bylaws of our congregation puts it this way: "This congregation shall hold membership in The Lutheran Church—Missouri Synod, so long as the Synod conforms to the congregation's confessional standard as set forth in Article III of this Constitution, or another orthodox Lutheran body which conforms to this confessional standard."

That "confessional standard" that we must above all else maintain reads: "This congregation acknowledges and accepts all the canonical books of the Old and New Testaments as the revealed Word of God, verbally inspired, and acknowledges and accepts all the Confessional Writings of the Evangelical Lutheran Church, contained in the Book of Concord of the year 1580, to be the true and genuine exposition of the doctrines of the Bible. These Confessional Writings are the three Ecumenical Creeds, (Apostles', Nicene, and Athanasian), the Unaltered Augsburg Confession, the Apology of the Augsburg Confession, the Smalcald Articles. Luther's Large and Small Catechisms, and the Formula of Concord."

While we rejoice that even after 175 years our Synod still holds firmly to the teachings of God's Word and this confessional standard, we dare not have any kind of a "holier than thou" or superior attitude! Rather, we mourn the decline of so many once solid church bodies and congregations, we sympathize with their faithful members who are suffering under unfaithful leadership, and as the song says, "We pray that all unity may one day be restored."

But, what a rare blessing it is these days that we indeed have such unity and continuity in our Synod that someone could be baptized in a Missouri Synod church in Chicago in 1921 and buried a century later from a Missouri Synod church in Kansas that is "exactly the same."


