

"Do not be anxious about anything, but in everything, by prayer and petition, with thanks giving, present your requests to God. And the peace of God, which surpasses all understanding, will keep your hearts and minds in Christ Jesus."

Philippians 4:4-6

What comes to mind when you think of Thanksgiving Day? Turkey and dressing; time off from school and work; parades and football games on TV; family feasts and overeating?

Thanksgiving Day is more than just turkeys and ball games and family get-togethers. Thanksgiving Day is a special day set aside by proclamation of the President of our nation for all citizens of this land to give thanks to God for the many great blessings we enjoy. But instead, many of us, perhaps even most of us, will spend this day as we do many other days: Instead of giving thanks for what we do have, worrying about the things we do not have.

Ever since Adam and Eve fell into sin, it has been part of our sinfulness to be dissatisfied with what we have and to worry about what we do not have. Adam and Eve lived in paradise.

Everything was perfect: no illness, no hunger, no hurting, no fighting, no anger. A perfect couple, a perfect marriage, a perfect world. What more could they ask for? What more could they want? But, even they fell into the devil's trap called dissatisfaction.

The one thing they could not have, the forbidden fruit, that the serpent convinced them, was the one thing they must have to be truly happy. And so instead of giving thanks and being happy with the surpassingly great blessings they did have, Adam and Eve yearned for that which they did not have. In the process they ruined their perfect lives, ruined their perfect marriage, and brought sin and evil into our world. Trying to obtain what they did not possess they lost the greatest earthly blessings anyone ever did possess.

Still today, the devil tempts us into that old trap called: dissatisfaction. Still today instead of giving thanks for what we do have, we worry about the things we do not have. Still today we go so far as to ruin our lives, ruin our marriages, fall into all sorts of sin and evil just to get our hands on the forbidden fruit.

A few years ago there was a story on 60 Minutes about a special minimum security prison in Florida. It is sometimes called the country-club prison, because most of the inmates were once successful businessmen or politicians. Many of them are still worth millions of dollars. One man said that at one time he had made as much as 2 million dollars a day. What more could a person want? These men had it all, but even they threw it all away to reach for the forbidden fruit. What they had wasn't enough. They even broke the law to get more, in the process ruining their lives.

What percentage of divorces do you think are blamed at least in part on disagreements over money? According

> to the experts money problems are at least partly the cause in over 90% of all divorces. And most of these are not poor people. They are people with good jobs and nice homes, comfortable people who already possess all the little luxuries of American life. And yet, instead of living together in love and giving thanks for what they do have, many couples fight and argue and worry about the things they do not have, in the process ruining their relationship in the guest for more and more things. That's why Proverbs 15:17 says, "It's better to eat a simple meal in a house filled with love, than a fancy feast in a house full of hatred."



The account of ten lepers being healed but only one returning to give thanks to Christ (Luke 17:11-19) is the traditional Gospel Reading for Thanksgiving Day. This woodcut illustrating that story is from Martin Luther's 1544 Exposition of the Epistles and Gospels for Advent.

It is part of our sinfulness to be dissatisfied. To forget the blessings we do have, to always be worrying about the things in life we do not have. Our materialistic society makes it even worse. Like the subtle temptations the serpent whispered in the garden, we are subtly taught in our society through advertising and the media that our main purpose in life is to acquire things, to be the ultimate consumer. Advertising leads us into the trap of believing we cannot be truly happy with what we have, that happiness comes from acquiring things, and it is exactly the things we do not yet have that finally will bring us happiness. But, then, the fashions change, or a new and improved model comes along, and once again we worry that we do not have it all.

Do you have in your mind a short little list of things you think you must have? And once you get these things, then you will finally be happy, finally be satisfied, finally be thankful, right? Wrong. An attitude of dissatisfaction sticks with you; you will simply move your sights and worry yourself about other things.

How can we put an end to this vicious cycle of dissatisfaction? How can we learn to be happy, satisfied and thankful? Paul gives us the answer: "Do not be anxious about anything, but in everything, by prayer and petition, with thanksgiving, present your requests to God" (Philippians 4:6).

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Instead of an attitude of dissatisfaction, live life with "an attitude of gratitude," giving thanks to God for His many blessings, especially the greatest blessing of all: Sending His Son to pay the penalty for your sins, forgiving all your sins for Jesus' sake.

God does forgive all your sins because Jesus shed His blood on the cross for you. God even forgives your sins of thanklessness and dissatisfaction. And God promises to hear and answer your prayers, to provide for your wants and needs, as Jesus said, "Ask, and it will be given you, seek and you will find, knock, and the door shall be opened unto you" (Matthew 7:7).

Paul puts it this way in Romans 8:32. "If God did not spare His own Son, but gave Him up for us all, will not also. along with Him, graciously give us all things?" Jesus said, in the Sermon on the Mount, "Therefore, I tell you, do not worry about your life, what you will eat or drink; or about your body, what you will wear. Look at the birds of the air; they do not sow or reap or store away in barns, and yet your heavenly Father feeds them. Are you not much more valuable than they? Who of you by worrying can add a single hour to his life? And why do you worry about clothes? See how the lilies of the field grow. They do not labor or spin. Yet I tell you that not even Solomon in all his splendor was dressed like one of these. If that is how God clothes the grass of the field, which is here today and tomorrow is thrown into the fire, will He not much more clothe you, O you of little faith? So do not worry, saying, 'What shall we eat?' or 'What shall we drink?' or 'What shall we wear?' For the pagans run after all these things, and your heavenly Father knows that you need them. But seek first His kingdom and His righteousness, and all these things will be added unto you" (Matthew 6:24-33).

A little baby is totally dependent upon its parents. They provide for all its needs because they love their child. You are the beloved child of God. God made you His child in Holy Baptism, when He washed away your sins and implanted faith in your heart to trust in Jesus as your Savior. God your heavenly

Father will provide for your needs. As Psalm 55:22 says, "Cast your burdens upon the Lord, for He cares for you."

Casting your cares upon your heavenly Father will give you peace that all the things of this world could give, as Paul says in Philippians 4:4-7, "Do not be anxious about anything, but in everything, by prayer and petition, with thanksgiving, present your requests to God. And the peace of God, which surpasses all understanding, will keep your hearts and minds in Christ Jesus."

## Looking Ahead to Advent & Christmas

The season of Advent begins on Sunday, November 28. With everyone this year still getting back "into the groove" of our normal holiday routines, here's a look ahead to our holiday schedule at Trinity this year.

**Christmas Communion** — Our annual "Christmas Carol Communion Service" with favorite Christmas carols being used for portions of the Liturgy will be on Sunday, December 19.

Two Christmas Eve Services — Because in the past the church could get very crowded on Christmas Eve and there is still a desire for some "social distancing" we will once again have two services on Christmas Eve this year, Friday, December 24, with an additional Candlelight Carol Service at 5:00pm that will not include the children's program, and the traditional Children's

Christmas Program at 7:00pm. Both services will feature the same sermon and your favorite carols, including "Silent Night" sung by candlelight.

Christmas Day — Our Christmas Day service will be on Saturday, December 25 at 10:00am. This is a great opportunity to celebrate Christmas at church and enjoy the beautiful Christmas trees, poinsettias, and other decorations in our sanctuary, but with generous "social distancing." The service will feature gradual lighting of the Advent Wreath as we read the story of Advent and Christmas and sing carols related to the readings.

First Sunday after Christmas —

This year we have Christmas services three days in a row! We will continue the celebration with the First Sunday after Christmas on Sunday, December 26, using a special order of worship featuring Christmas carols being used for parts of the Liturgy.

No New Year's Day Service — For this year only we will not have a service on New Year's Day. Pastor and Terry Vogts will be departing for England on December 27 for their son Jacob's marriage to Fiona Howat in her hometown of Manchester, and not return until mid-January. A guest minister could not be found for New Year's Day so it was decided to cancel that service for this year only. Our guest minister for January 2 and 9 will be Rev. Roger Schepmann. He will conduct the installation of church officers and board members for 2022 at the service on Sunday, January 2.

Epiphany Celebration Transferred to January 2 — Epiphany, when we commemorate the visit of the Wise Men, is the "12th Day of Christmas" and actually falls on January 6, which this year is a Thursday. Therefore, we will transfer our observance of Epiphany to the previous Sunday, January 2.

Oh, come, let us adore Him, Christ, the Rord!

#### Voters Assembly Summary



Meeting was called to order by Chairman Windler, with Pastor Vogts offering opening devotion and song. Roll was answered by 18 members; there were no new member requests.

Financial reports by the home treasurer and missions treasurer were given. Pastor Vogts reported on his official acts, worship, education, and administration efforts up to the fourth quarter of 2021.

Trustees reported on numerous items, including barn upgrade being complete, old church sign debris removed, cemetery headstone alignment, chair cart for the elevator, and elevator reset needed after a power outage. A meeting will be held to finalize new church sign design and location.

Officers elected are Chairman – Greg Windler, Elder – Darrel Rodewald, Trustee – Dave Prothe, Board of Education – Nancy Golubski, Finance Committee – Lori Schlegel, Usher – Mike England, Secretary – Jim Prothe. Reports were heard from the Endowment Committee, Board of Education, Youth, and Blocktoberfest.

Work by the outreach committee continues; future direction is needed. The 2022 Mission Budget was set at \$7500, the same as 2021. Thanksgiving loose offering will go to missions; Christmas Eve and Christmas Day loose offerings will go to our mission partner.

Endowment committee appointments of Kynda Harshman and Jeff Thompson were approved. The church will be used for the November 2 election, and will be locked in conjunction with same.

Discussion was held regarding having Communion on the first and third Sunday's year around, with action being tabled until the January meeting.

The 2022 New Year's Day service will not be held due to Pastor Vogts being on vacation, and no additional

Pastor available; installation of officers will be held at the January 2 service. Discussion was held regarding the need for additional audio/visual help.

## MISSI@N NEWS

In addition to our regular giving to missions, for many years Trinity has also given additional "Together in Mission" gifts to support a particluar missionary family. Currently, our "Together in Mission" contributions help fund the work of Rev. Joel & Deaconess Clarion Fritsche, who with their sons Viktor, Sergei, and Andrei serve in the Dominican Republic.

Rev. Fritsche was born in Houston, Texas. He earned a bachelor's degree in music from Concordia University, Nebraska, Seward, Nebraska, and received his Master of Divinity from Concordia Seminary, St. Louis. Before becoming a missionary, he served as a pastor of congregations in Wyoming, Texas and Illinois, and worked as an admissions counselor at the seminary.

Deaconess Fritsche was born and raised in the Republic of Panama. She graduated from Balboa High School in 1996 and received a bachelor's degree in education from Concordia University Wisconsin, Mequon, Wisconsin. She taught for several years in Lutheran schools before entering the mission field with her family, and to aid in her mission work recently also became a deaconess through study with Concordia Theological Seminary, Fort Wayne.



Through our "Together in Mission" contributions our congregation gives special support to Rev. Joel & Deaconess Clarion Fritsche, who with their sons Viktor, Sergei, and Andrei serve in the Dominican Republic.

Rev. Fritsche serves as the director of Concordia Seminary in Palmar Arriba, teaching courses to prepare men to be pastors not only the Dominican Republic but throughout Latin America and the Caribbean. He also helps the local pastors plant and develop new churches in the region.

Deaconess Fritsche serves as a deaconess at the "home church" of the seminary, Iglesia Luterana del Pueblo Nuevo (Lutheran Church of Pueblo Nuevo), where she directs Sunday school, Vacation Bible School, and women's Bible studies. She also supports the wives of the seminarians with Bible studies and other activities to help

prepare them for their new role as a pastor's wife. In addition, she assists with curriculum and teaching in the Lutheran parochial schools in Licey and Palmar Arriba.

Rev. Fritsche shares some news about our seminary in the Dominican Republic:

Last year due to COVID we were in and out of the classroom, bouncing between in-person and virtual classes, with two quarantine periods from close brushes with the virus. But, an even bigger issue for us than COVID was a problem with the solar panel system that supplies essential electricity for our seminary complex, but thanks to generous donors it is working again after a major repair and update.

Despite these challenges we rejoiced to graduate eight more men from our seminary this past May, most of whom are already ordained and serving congregations in their home countries. I traveled to Bolivia for the ordination of two of our recent Bolivian graduates. We have had at least five graduates from Bolivia and now three current students. Our faculty recently spent several months teaching continuing education classes for all of the current pastors in Bolivia by Zoom.

Things are opening up in the Dominican Republic as more and more people are getting vaccinated. Worship attendance at the congregation in Pueblo Nuevo has been returning to normal. We have a superb team of evangelists hitting the pavement twice a week to take the Gospel to the doorsteps of family, friends, and neighbors of the church members.

Seminarians Hector and Carlos each led an evangelistic Bible study series in two different areas of the community. One was outside a member's home where numerous women gather daily in the afternoon under the shade of a tree to visit. The second was in the home of a recent contact we made through another church member. The next step is to continue visiting these folks and working toward catechism classes and active church participation. We could soon have a nice-sized new catechism class! Please pray that the Lord would bless these evangelistic efforts.

This year, despite curfews and COVID restrictions, we were finally able to celebrate Holy Week and Easter services in our new church building at Pueblo Nuevo. We moved into our present location in 2019, but last year for Holy Week and Easter we could only gather virtually. It was wonderful to be together to shout "Christ is risen! Alleluia" this Easter.
