PASTOR'S *Christmas Message*

The Unlikely Carols of Christmas

It's that wonderful time of year again, when not only churches but also radio and television, lobbies and offices, stores and shopping malls, are all filled with the beautiful music of Christmas. Of course, this includes healthy doses of popular favorites such as "Jingle Bells" and silly songs like "Rudolph the Red-Nosed Reindeer."

However, in today's secularized society, often hostile to the Christian faith and message, it is quite amazing and a marvelous blessing how we actually hear over and over again, in the familiar words of the old Christmas carols blaring over the airwaves and in public places, the real "reason for the season":

*Joy to the world, the Lord is come!
Let earth receive her King!
Let every heart prepare Him room.*

*Come, adore on bended knee
Christ the Lord, the newborn King.*

*Nails, spear shall pierce Him through,
The cross be borne for me, for you.*

*Christ, the Savior is born . . .
Jesus, Lord at Thy birth.*

*Oh, come, let us adore Him,
Christ, the Lord!*

They bear such wonderful witness, but some of our most treasured Christmas songs could actually be called "The *Unlikely* Carols of Christmas." For, either the words, or music, or both were not originally intended to celebrate our Savior's birth.

Isaac Watts, who wrote the words for "Joy to the World" (LSB 387), is considered, along with Charles Wesley, one of the greatest English hymn writers. Watts actually had the most hymns of any author in *The Lutheran Hymnal* of 1941, with 31 or nearly 5% of all the hymns — even Martin Luther had only 26! This was reduced to 13 hymns by Watts in our current *Lutheran Service Book*, but many of these are well-known favorites, such as "When I Survey the Wondrous Cross" (LSB 425) and "Oh, That the Lord Would Guide My Ways" (LSB 707).

In today's secularized society it is quite amazing and a marvelous blessing how we actually hear, in the familiar words of the old Christmas carols blaring over the airwaves and in public places, the real "reason for the season."

Born in England in 1674, Watts was the son of a minister and an extremely intelligent child prodigy, fluent in Greek, Hebrew, and Latin, and winning a poetry prize at age eight. He went on to become a famous poet and philosopher, receiving his doctorate degree and writing some 60 books on a variety of subjects. He studied so hard that that he eventually made himself mentally ill. It was said of him, "From the mouth of a madman poured forth the greatest praise of all time!"

Watts was displeased with the poor poetry of the hymnals in his day, to which his father replied, "Give us something better." So, that's exactly what he did! Deciding to write his own hymnal at age 20, Watts took two years off from college for this huge undertaking. For these two

years he wrote one new hymn a week, with his home congregation every Sunday singing his latest hymn. He published these hymns as *Hymns and Spiritual Songs*, which is considered the first true English hymnal — earning him the title "Father of English Hymnody." He lived to be 74 and in his lifetime wrote over 750 hymns.

As far as the original author and composer were concerned, "Joy to the World" wasn't a Christmas song at all!

"Joy to the World" is Watts' paraphrase of Psalm 98 — but it most certainly was *not* written as a Christmas song! Because, under the Puritans from 1644-1660 an Act of Parliament banned the celebration of Christmas in England. Along with most other holy days, Christmas (literally "Christ Mass") was considered a "popish," "Romanish" holdover, from which Protestant England must be purified.

Although when Watts lived the Puritan era had passed and the celebration of Christmas was legal again in England, it was still "suspect" and not widely observed by English Protestants. It is hard to conceive that the author of "Joy to the World" probably never once in his life celebrated Christmas!

But, if "Joy to the World" was not written as a Christmas carol, what kind of hymn was it? Actually, the theme of

both the original Psalm 98 and the hymn Watts based upon it is not Christ's *first* coming at Christmas, but His *second* coming and the final judgment at the last day. This decidedly non-Christmas theme is seen in the title Watts himself gave to this hymn when he published it in 1719: "The Messiah's Second Coming and Kingdom."

Mendelssohn actually wrote to his publisher about the tune now used for "Hark! The Herald Angels Sing" instructing: "It will never work with sacred words."

George Frederick Handel, who composed the stirring music now used for "Joy to the World," would be equally mystified by the modern association of this hymn tune with Christmas. For, it is an arrangement of themes from his famous oratorio "Messiah," which although is now often performed during the Christmas season, was really intended by Handel for performance at Easter.

So, as far as the original author and composer were concerned, "Joy to the World" wasn't a Christmas song at all! They considered it rather a hymn about

"The Messiah's Second Coming and Kingdom," set to music for an Easter oratorio.

Another of "The *Unlikely* Carols of Christmas" is "Hark! The Herald Angels Sing" (LSB 380). The words were indeed written as a Christmas poem in 1739 by the other great English hymn writer Charles Wesley, and the tune is from an oratorio written over a century later in 1840 by German composer Felix Mendelssohn.

However, though he was a deeply devout Lutheran, Mendelssohn did not write this melody as a hymn tune — but part of an oratorio to commemorate the invention of the printing press! In fact, Mendelssohn actually penned a letter instructing his publisher about this tune: "If the right words are hit on, I am sure that this piece will be liked very much by singers and hearers. *But it will never work with sacred words.*"

As you hum along with the ever-present, familiar Christmas music take a real trip down memory lane — all the way back to the first Christmas and the real "reason for the season"!

It wasn't until 1856 that Wesley's words and Mendelssohn's tune were combined, to create the beloved Christmas carol that we know so well today. By that time both Wesley and Mendelssohn had passed into the great multitude singing praises around the heavenly throne (Revelation 7:9-12). So, it is really astounding to think that neither the author nor the composer of "Hark! The Herald Angels Sing" ever heard together those wonderful words sung to that music so familiar to us.

This year, as you hum along with the radio and ever-present Christmas "muzak" and listen to your Christmas CD's — or even vinyl albums, which are making a comeback! — take a real trip down memory lane. Remembering *all the way back* — to the very first Christmas and the real "reason for the season"!

*Hark! The herald angels sing,
"Glory to the newborn King!
Peace on earth and mercy mild,
God and sinners reconciled!" . . .
Veiled in flesh the Godhead see,
Hail the incarnate Deity!*

No New Year's Day Service —For this year only we will not have a service on New Year's Day. Pastor and Terry Vogts will be departing for England on December 27 for their son Jacob's marriage to Fiona Howat in her hometown of Manchester, and not return until mid-January. A guest minister could not be found for New Year's Day so it was decided to cancel that service for this year only. Our guest minister for January 2 and 9 will be Rev. Roger Schepmann. Epiphany Celebration Transferred to January 2 — Epiphany, when we commemorate the visit of the Wise Men, is the "12th Day of Christmas" and actually falls on January 6, which this year is a Thursday. Therefore, we will transfer our observance of Epiphany to the previous Sunday, January 2.



Ghana's 7th Graders Put Most of Us to Shame

Just one example of the amazing stories our LCMS missionaries share from the mission field: Consider the 7th graders in Ghana studying the Augsburg Confession—and about half of them come from Muslim families!



It's hard to believe, isn't it? After all, even many confirmed Lutheran adults in North America have never read this important piece of Lutheran doctrine. But, at the Concordia

Preparatory School supported by he LCMS in northern Ghana, the young teens not only read the Augsburg Confession as one of their assigned texts, they also have questions—lots of questions!

“For example, when they read the ‘First Article: Concerning God,’ they discuss the Islamic view of God, what

traditional [African idol] worshipers believe, and what we [Lutherans] believe, teach and confess,” says Rev. Nicholas Salifu, a native missionary pastor who attended the LCMS Concordia Theological Seminary, Ft. Wayne, Indiana and is now supported by the LCMS in his home country.

“When it came to the Son of God, the Muslims would not understand why God has a Son. Here we provide the explanation. They often have questions on the Trinity, which we also sometimes have. The Holy Spirit will help each and every one of us to understand the Word better.”
