Dear Brothers and Sisters in Christ,

In the early Church a controversy arose about when Easter should be celebrated. Some felt it should be on a fixed date, like Christmas on December 25 or Epiphany on January 6, and therefore, like those holidays, should cycle through the days of the week, just as Passover itself does. If this system had been adopted, Easter would be celebrated some years on a Monday, Tuesday, etc., and would only fall on a Sunday approximately every seven years (depending on leap year).

Others felt that because the Passover "on the night when He was betrayed" (1 Corinthians 11:23) fell that year on a Thursday, and so "the third day He rose again from the dead" was on a Sunday, "the first day of the week" (Matthew 28:1), therefore in commemoration of these events Easter should always be celebrated on a Sunday, and thus Maundy Thursday on a Thursday, and Good Friday on a Friday.

At one time this dispute became quite heated and even led to a bit of a split in the early Church. Eventually, a rather complicated compromise was reached. Easter would always be celebrated on a Sunday—but *which* particular Sunday would be determined by the phases of the moon in a manner similar to the date of Passover. The formula is stated this way in *Lutheran Service Book*: "Easter Day is always the Sunday after the full moon that occurs on or after the spring equinox on March 21. The full moon may happen on any date between March 21 and April 18 inclusive. If the full moon falls on a Sunday, Easter Day is the Sunday following. Easter Day cannot be earlier than March 22 or later than April 25" (page xxiii).

This explains why the date of Easter varies so much from year to year. Actually, an interesting upshot of this method is that the full cycle of Easter dates is nearly like the infinite "irrational number" Pi, the pattern for the dates of Easter repeating only every 5,700,000 years!

I have an interesting personal connection to this cycle of the dates of Easter. I was born on Easter Sunday, April 17, 1960. Years ago when looking over a table of the dates of Easter, I noticed that the first time after 1960 that Easter again occurred on my birthday was this year, April 17, 2022—my 62nd birthday. I decided back then that would be an appropriate day for me to retire, and had long planned that I would be retiring on Easter Sunday several months ago.

However, as Proverbs 16:9 reminds us, "In his heart a man plans his course, but the LORD determines his steps." My longstanding plans for retirement on my 62nd birthday were interrupted by COVID in 2020, which caused most church activities to be suspended for over a year. To make up for those lost months of ministry, I decided to postpone my retirement to the end of 2022.

Therefore, instead of retiring this year on Easter Sunday, as I had originally planned, I have notified the congregational Chairman and Board of Elders that my last Sunday serving as Pastor of Trinity Lutheran Church will be Christmas Day, December 25, 2022, which happens to fall this year on the last Sunday of the year. I am making this announcement now to allow the congregation time to secure a Vacancy Pastor.

Including my pre-seminary and seminary education, I have been preparing to serve or serving as a Pastor for 44 years. It has been a great joy and honor to actively serve in The Lutheran Church—Missouri Synod since my ordination in 1986, including the last nine years at Trinity. Terry and I have really enjoyed our time here and we will always look very fondly upon our years with you.

My service here was especially significant for me personally, because my great-great-grandparents, Johann and Katherina Windler, settled at Block Corners, about a mile north of the church, in 1865; they were founding members of the congregation in 1868; and my great-great-grandmother, who passed away in 1870, is buried in the first row of Trinity's cemetery. What a special privilege it was for me, as their descendant, to serve 150 years later as the Pastor here!

Terry and I will remain in the Kansas City area after my retirement, and she plans to continue working at this time. Because of the necessity for us to have our own home ready to move into upon my retirement, we have purchased a home at 4908 Northeast 78th Terrace, Kansas City, Missouri, 64119. Over the coming months we will be gradually moving our possessions and arranging things there. We may occasionally spend the night in our new home, and at some point close to the end of the year, when most of our furniture and other things have been moved, we will live there full-time and I will commute to Trinity. But, until then the parsonage will remain our primary residence.

Although I am, Lord willing, retiring from full-time service at the end of this year, I plan to remain active, hopefully serving vacancies, pulpit supply, or perhaps somewhere as a part-time pastoral assistant.

August-September Sermon Series



The word "beatitude" means a blessing that is pronounced, and the state of blessedness which results. When we hear the word "beatitude" we think first of the famous beatitudes which Jesus proclaimed in the Sermon on the Mount (Matthew 5:1-11). However, there is another set of beatitudes in the Bible, "Revelation's Seven Beautiful Beatitudes," which we will meditate on for our sermons during August and September.

August 7 — Revelation's First Beautiful Beatitude

Revelation 1:3 — "Blessed is the one who reads the words of this prophecy, and blessed are those who hear it and take to heart what is written in it, because the time is near."

August 14 — Revelation's Second Beautiful Beatitude

Revelation 14:13 — "Then I heard a voice from heaven say, 'Write: Blessed are the dead who die in the Lord.'"

August 21 — Revelation's Third Beautiful Beatitude

Revelation 16:15 — "Behold, I come like a thief! Blessed is he who stays awake and keeps his clothes with him, so that he may not go naked and be shamefully exposed."

August 28 — Revelation's Fourth Beautiful Beatitude

Revelation 19:9 — "Then the angel said to me, Write: Blessed are those who are invited to the wedding supper of the Lamb!""

September 4 — Revelation's Fifth Beautiful Beatitude

Revelation 20:6 — "Blessed and holy are those who have part in the first resurrection. The second death has no power over them."

September 11 — Revelation's Sixth Beautiful Beatitude

Revelation 22:7 — "Behold, I am coming soon! Blessed is he who keeps the words of the prophecy in this book."

September 25 — Revelation's Seventh Beautiful Beatitude

Revelation 22:14 — "Blessed are those who wash their robes, that they may have the right to the tree of life and may go through the gates into the city."

The Paola care facilities have all resumed worship services, though that could change at any time, so we are again filling our assigned Sundays when allowed. Masks are required.


