Martin Luther Rewired Your Brain? Yep — And Your Whole Life Too!

When we think of the blessings that Martin Luther and the Lutheran Reformation brought to our world, we of course think first of the great spiritual blessings that as a result have filtered down to billions of people since. Luther's rediscovery of the Gospel and unlocking of the Scriptures gives spiritual comfort, strength, and guidance for life in this world, and most of all the surpassing blessing of eternal life. Daniel 12:3 promises that in heaven, "Those who lead many to righteousness will shine like the stars forever and ever," and surely Martin Luther will be one of the greatest lights in heavenly glory.

However, you may not realize the profound impact Martin Luther, and the Reformation that he launched, has had upon your entire life — even the very makeup of your brain! That is the fascinating conclusion of Dr. Joseph Henrich, Professor of Human Evolutionary Biology at Harvard University, in a recent fascinating article, "Martin Luther Rewired Your Brain."

Dr. Henrich begins by noting that Martin Luther was the first world leader to strongly emphasize teaching reading and writing to all people. In his famous sermon from 1530, "On Keeping Children in School," Luther said: "The common people... ought at least to read [and] write... even women and children." And in 1528 he organized in Saxony what is arguably the first public school system, instructing: "The preachers are to exhort the people to send their children to school so that persons are educated for competent service both in Church and State."

What Martin Luther did five centuries ago has made you and our society today "WIRED" — Western, Industrialized, Rich, Educated, and Democratic.

This was a priority for Luther because the general ignorance and illiteracy that was predominant during the "Dark Ages" — when even many clergy could not read and write! — had been the primary reason for the widespread loss of the Gospel and pure doctrine, which can only come from the Word of God. Instead, many false teachings had been introduced into the Church, which Luther had to battle against. So, Luther's foremost goal in advocating education was to give all Christians, not only clergy but also laity, the ability to read and study the Scriptures themselves.

As Dr. Henrich explains: "When did people decide that everyone should learn to read? . . . the belief that every person should read and interpret the Bible for themselves began to rapidly diffuse across Europe with the eruption of the Protestant Reformation. . . Protestants came to believe that both

boys and girls had to study the Bible for themselves to better know their God."

This is indeed the model for Christian knowledge given in the Bible itself: "Now the Bereans . . . received the message with great eagerness and examined the Scriptures every day to see if what Paul said was true" (Acts 17:11).

Luther also extolled the other great benefits that widespread education would have for society. That is why, in addition to being the founder of public schools, Martin Luther — who was born only 15 years after the death of Gutenberg, his fellow German and inventor of the printing press — is also considered the father of the public library, admonishing the city officials of Germany in 1524: "No cost nor pains should be spared to procure good libraries in suitable buildings. . . For if a knowledge of the Gospel and of every kind of learning is to be preserved, it must be embodied in books. . ."

Other Protestants followed the example of the Lutherans, and Dr. Henrich notes that data shows within decades Protestant nations had much higher levels of literacy, and as a result greater prosperity and societal progress in many areas — what is known as the "Protestant Work Ethic."

From his standpoint as a Professor of Human Evolutionary Biology, Dr. Henrich observes that learning to read, particularly at a young age, actually physically "rewires" the human brain in many advantageous ways: "As you learned to read, probably as a child, your brain reorganized itself to better accommodate your efforts, which had both functional and inadvertent consequences for your mind. . . Your brain has been altered, neurologically rewired."

The results of this brain alteration, for you as an individual and collectively for society as a whole, can be summed up with the acronym: "WIRED." For,

Dr.Henrich says that what Martin Luther did five centuries ago to promote widespread education has not only "rewired" your brain, but has made you, and our society today: "Western, Industrialized, Rich, Educated, and Democratic."

So, all of Christendom and the entire world, even non-Christians, benefit in many different ways from the blessings brought about by the Lutheran Reformation. And over 500 years after that Reformation, we rejoice to be members of a Lutheran congregation and conservative Synod that still clings to the pure Gospel and true teachings of God's Word, restored to the Church by Martin Luther.

Fostering a Lutheran Identity in Latin America

On May 27, 2022 three pastors and 12 deaconesses graduated from *Centro de Misericordia y Seminario Concordia el Reformador* (Concordia the Reformer Seminary and Mercy Center) in Palmar Arriba, Dominican Republic. The graduates will serve the church throughout Latin America as they head to Peru, Chile, Mexico, Panama, Guatemala, Venezuela and other nations.

"God takes you in many ways. . . I never thought I would be a pastor. But God led me here out of my country to learn the truth so that I can return to my home country to tell them the truth," said the Rev. Jeancarlos Ramírez, who graduated from Concordia after four vears of residential education. Ramírez. who will serve the church in his native city of Lima, Peru, especially looks forward to bringing the Gospel to children and families. "Everything you learn in seminary — it's important to think about how to communicate that to kids, to people who don't know. . . We don't change the truth but learn how to share it with kids so that they can understand."

Concordia forms pastors to spread the Gospel, plant Lutheran churches and show mercy. It also trains deaconesses to serve alongside pastors to show the mercy of God in Christ to those who are in need and facing difficulties.



In addition to three new pastors twelve new deaconesses graduated.

Deaconess Danelle Putnam, an LCMS missionary and associate coordinator of the deaconess program at Concordia, noted that most of the graduating deaconesses will not be paid. They see their service to the church and others as their reward. "The three-year program here consists of nine main core courses that train the women and instruct them in the Bible and Lutheran doctrine. We also have fieldwork that the women do to give them practice in caring for people, in reaching out to their neighbor."

"The deaconess works alongside the pastor in different areas like Christian education and mercy work" Putnum explained.

The graduates leave Concordia to serve the church throughout South and Central America. Rev. Rafael Flores looks forward to serving in his native Chile, where the church has few pastors. When asked what he learned while studying at Concordia, he replied, "Without a doubt, the mercy and love of God . . . the most important thing is now to show mercy toward others."
